
#### **Rugby Success**

#### **Year 11 Visit to London**

Students met bright and early (it wasn't bright) on Wednesday morning at 3.30am ready for a three day trip packed full to the brim. On arrival we went straight into Parliament for a guided tour around the House of Lords. We finished our visit with a discussion with our local MP, Sir Julian Smith, where our students asked him a wide variety of challenging and interesting questions. After this we made our way to the Graffiti Tunnel at Leake Street Arches to admire the existing artwork and add our own masterpieces to it as part of the idea that it is an ever-changing exhibition. Next, students enjoyed the view from the top of the London Eye before experiencing the thrills of history in the London Dungeon. The final part of day one was a spot of shopping and dinner in one of the large shopping centres that London has to offer.

Day two was no less busy! The day began with a trip to the Tower of London to see the Crown Jewels, where the ravens that inhabit the Tower quickly became the star attraction! A leisurely cruise down the Thames with a picnic lunch ensued, leading on to a trip to the wonderful St Paul's Cathedral. After many (many) stairs, students were rewarded with my favourite view of London from outside the cathedral's dome. Shopping time in Covent Garden and dinner at the Hard Rock Cafe were next, before the group split to enjoy a choice of shows at the theatre. Half the group enjoyed the hilarious comedy, 'Mrs Doubtfire', whilst the others were entertained with the musical extravaganza (with a bit of a history lesson thrown in) that is 'Six'.
